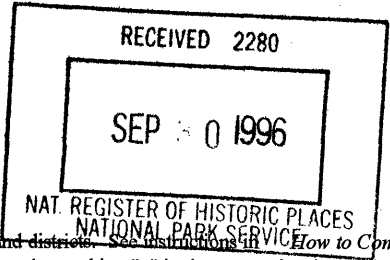

An expanded statement of significance is given in the Boundary Markers of the Original District of Columbia Multiple Documentation Form.

Southeast boundary stone #5 was the twenty-second marker to be located in Maryland. (Southeast #4 no longer exists.) It was laid in 1792. Its fence was dedicated by the Louisa Adams Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution c. 1916.

Verbal Boundary Description:

The stone is located approximately 45 feet southeast of the centerline of Southern Avenue and 280 feet northeast of the centerline of Valley Terrace, S.E. The fence surrounds the stone.

Boundary Justification:

The boundary stone and fence have historically been situated at this location and maintain historic integrity.
